Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest." — v. 37-38

Parting Shot – If there is one thing the past couple of months has impressed upon me it is this: the Lord and Savior Jesus Christ is the only hope for the world. Politics is not, even if at times we experience good government. Science and Medicine is not, even though we rejoice in some temporal benefits. But death is still complete with every generation. The same can be said for education, striving for social and judicial justice, entertainment, the list goes on. No, Christ is the only and ultimate hope. Apart from Him the fields lie fallow awaiting the potential of a joyous harvest.

Jn 4:35 Do you not say, 'There are yet four months, then comes the harvest'? Look, I tell you, lift up your eyes, and see that the fields are white for harvest. (the Samaritan woman near the town of Sychar [soo-khar])

Paul would start in the synagogues... (cf. Acts 9:20; 13:3, 14; 14:1; 17:1, 10, 17; 18:4)

1 Cor 3:6-7 I planted, Apollos watered, but God gave the growth. So neither he who plants nor he who waters is anything, but only God who gives the growth.

The Desperate are unashamed to cry out and beg for mercy: like the two blind men in **Mt 9:27** or the Canaanite Woman in **Mt 15:22**.

Mt 9:27 And as Jesus passed on from there, two blind men followed him, crying aloud, "Have mercy on us, Son of David."

³⁵And Jesus went throughout all the cities and villages, teaching in their synagogues and proclaiming the gospel of the kingdom and healing every disease and every affliction. ³⁶When he saw the crowds, he had compassion for them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. ³⁷Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; ³⁸therefore pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest." ...

10:5These twelve Jesus sent out, instructing them. "Go nowhere among the Gentiles and enter no town of the Samaritans. 6but go rather to the lost sheep of the house of Israel. ⁷And proclaim as you go. saying, 'The kingdom of heaven is at hand.' 8Heal the sick, raise the dead, cleanse lepers, cast out demons. You received without paying; give without pay. ⁹Acquire no gold nor silver nor copper for vour belts. 10no bag for your journey, nor two tunics nor sandals nor a staff, for the laborer deserves his food. 11And whatever town or village you enter, find out who is worthy in it and stay there until you depart. ¹²As you enter the house, greet it, ¹³And if the house is worthy, let your peace come upon it, but if it is not worthy, let your peace return to you. 14And if anyone will not receive you or listen to your words. shake off the dust from your feet when you leave that house or town. 15Truly. I say to vou, it will be more bearable on the day of judgment for the land of Sodom and Gomorrah than for that town

Mt 15:22 And behold, a Canaanite woman from that region came out and was crying, "Have mercy on me, O Lord, Son of David; my daughter is severely oppressed by a demon."

In 1 Ki 19 Elijah complained, "and I, even I only, am left, and they seek my life, to take it away." And the Lord answered, "I will leave seven thousand in Israel, all the knees that have not bowed to Baal."

The Lord assured the returning exiles in **Zechariah 4**: "not by might, nor by power, but by my Spirit."

In 1 Peter 2 we hear of a spiritual priesthood of all believers. This does not mean there are not to be Pastors, but rather, that all of us can speak of our hope, pray for others, and show compassion and mercy.
