What are such sins? (that we might confess)

We can examine our everyday life according to the Ten Commandments - for example, how we act toward father or mother, son or daughter, husband or wife, or toward the people with whom we work, and so on. We may ask ourselves whether we have been disobedient or unfaithful, bad -tempered or dishonest, or whether we have hurt anyone by word or deed.

How might we confess our sins privately?

We may say we wish to confess our sins and to receive absolution in God's name. We may begin by saying, "I, a poor sinner, confess before God that I am guilty of many sins." Then we should name the sins that trouble us. We may close the confession with the words, "I repent of all these sins and pray for mercy, I promise to do better with God's help."

Prayer based on Confession and Absolution the Second Question "What is Private Confession?" Lord Jesus Christ, I give You thanks that my sins are forgiven before Your Father in heaven. By the Holy Spirit, give me grace to trust in Your promises and so live in the freedom and peace that You have won for me in Your death and resurrection. 

10 READ INTRODUCTION TO PORTION OF CATECHISM FOR THIS WEEK

Confession And Absolution the Second Question "What is Private Confession?" - This is the second of three weeks that we are looking into the matter of Private Confession. An obvious question many will ask, "Is it necessary to have an intermediary to confess our sins to? Can't we simply pray and confess our sins directly to Christ our Lord?" And the obvious answer, at least from a Lutheran perspective, is that we can and should confess directly to Christ. As Scripture clearly states, He alone is our mediator with God the Father (cf. 1 Timothy 2:5). But there can be great benefit in making our confession of sins to God in the hearing of a Pastor. As much as it appears that the confession is being spoken to the Pastor, it actually is being directed to God in the hearing of the Pastor! So what is the benefit? That an appointed ambassador of Christ, that is the Pastor, can speak audibly and directly the absolution to the one making the confession. This can be of obvious comfort in believing the promise that if we confess our sins God is faithful and just, and will forgive our sins (cf. 1 John 1:9). Furthermore, the Pastor, as the Confessor, not only can speak the Word of Forgiveness in the stead of Christ, but he can also offer comfort and encouragement with further assurances from God's Word.
