Catechism Portion for the Week

The Close of the Commandments. God obviously cares about how we live our lives. Because He is the source of life and of all that exists, He wants us to cling to Him. And it should not surprise us that God jealously guards his Commandments so that all within in His creation may prosper. And even after we have failed to keep His Commandments and turn to Him for mercy, He promises us His Commandments still show how our lives are intended to be lived. As Christians we understand the Commandments to function as a curb, a mirror, and a guide. As a curb it reduces the amount of evil that might otherwise happen. As a mirror it shows us our rebellious sinfulness and our need for a Savior. And as a guide, it still reliably points the forgiven sinner in the right direction of loving God and loving and serving our neighbor.



Portion of the Catechism and Luther's Explanation

What does God say about all these commandments?

He says, "I, the LORD your God, am a jealous God, punishing the children for the sin of the fathers to the third and fourth generation of those who hate Me, but showing love to a thousand generations of those who love Me and keep My commandments." (Ex. 20: 5–6)

What does this mean?

God threatens to punish all who break these commandments. Therefore, we should fear His wrath and not do anything against them. But He promises grace and every blessing to all who keep these commandments. Therefore, we should also love and trust in Him and gladly do what He commands.



Prayer Based on the Portion of the Catechism

Prayer based on the Close of the Commandments: Holy and merciful God, you have taught us what you would have us do and not do. Pour out your Holy Spirit on us so that He may bear fruit in our lives and that, remembering your mercies and your laws, we may grow in obedience to your will and in love for you and our neighbor. Help us to follow the example of your dear Son, Jesus Christ, our Lord, in whose name we pray. Amen. [from Luther's Small Catechism: with explanation; Concordia Pub, pg. 127]
