Catechism Portion for the Week

The Second Petition of the Lord's Prayer: "Thy kingdom come" – When we read the account of our Lord Jesus before Pontius Pilate in John 18:33-40 we see that Pilate misunderstood the nature of Jesus' kingdom and His rule as King. And yet still today as Christians we often misunderstand the nature and timing of our Lord's rule. If in fact God has ushered in His kingdom through the life, death, and resurrection of Christ, why do we still see so many problems in the world today? As Christians, we believe and confess that Christ's present (but hidden) reign as King is being extended by the Holy Spirit through the Gospel. It will be fully revealed when Christ returns in glory. And since we know that Christ will return to bring an end to the devil's present work of unbelief, sin, and death, we know that relying on God's grace and the work of His Holy Spirit, we are to believe and be led by God's holy Word so that we can begin to live godly lives now here on earth.



Portion of the Catechism and Luther's Explanation

The Second Petition

Thy kingdom come.

What does this mean?

The kingdom of God certainly comes by itself without our prayer, but we pray in this petition that it may come to us also.

How does God's kingdom come?

God's kingdom comes when our heavenly Father gives us His Holy Spirit, so that by His grace we believe His holy Word and lead godly lives here in time and there in eternity.
